Establish and nurture relationships with First Nations, Métis, Inuit and Urban Indigenous partners in B.C. and advocate for Indigenous children, youth, young adults and families.

Promote services and supports that address and reduce the over-involvement of the child welfare system in the lives of First Nations, Métis, Inuit and Urban Indigenous young people and their families and communities.

Inherent Rights

First Nations, Métis and Inuit children have the inherent right to be supported in their families, extended families, kin and communities. These rights include a special collective right to cultural identity and to sustain that identity through the sacred relationship that has existed from time immemorial with their ancestral territories.

Context of Indigenous Child Welfare in B.C.

- Many federal and provincial policies have caused immeasurable harm to First Nations, Métis and Inuit children, youth and families, including the cultural genocide of residential schools that contributed to the Sixties Scoop and ongoing child welfare crisis.
- First Nations, Métis and Inuit children and youth are 8% of B.C.'s children and youth while they make up about 66% of children in care.
- 24 delegated Aboriginal Agencies serve First Nations, Métis and Inuit children, youth and families across B.C.
- Nations around B.C. are actively pursuing resumption of child welfare jurisdiction which is enabled by the federal Act respecting First Nations, Inuit and Métis children, youth and families, along with agreements with the Ministry of Children and Family Development.
