A Parent's Responsibility: Government's obligation to improve the mental health outcomes of children in care RCY Annual Review Year 1

The Representative released her report *A Parent's Responsibility: Government's obligation to improve the mental health outcomes of children in care* in September 2022. The report contained six recommendations to address mental health outcomes through improved screening, assessment and intervention services for children in care. The recommendations in this report are offered to both Ministry of Children and Family Development (MCFD) and Indigenous Child and Family Service Agencies (ICFSA) who are responsible for services to more than half of the Indigenous children in care. The intention of the Representative's recommendations is to enhance the knowledge and understanding about mental health concerns experienced by all children who are in care or at risk of admission into care, and to ensure that systematic action is taken to screen, assess and address mental health concerns in a timely, trauma-informed and culturally attuned way.

MCFD and ICFSA Directors have not submitted an action plan or annual report of progress in response to recommendations made in this report as of the one year review. Instead, the Representative received a written update from MCFD and ICFSA Directors on October 31, 2023 to serve as evidence for the year one annual assessment, as such, the assessment below reflects the limited information provided and limited progress to date.

RCY Assessment Definitions:

- **Complete** = All activities that directly support the implementation of the recommendation are complete
- Substantial Progress = Most of the activities that directly support the implementation of the recommendation are complete
- Some Progress = Some of the activities that directly support the implementation of the recommendation are complete

No Progress The ICFSA Directors/MCFD have established an Agreement to Collaborate, signed July 18, 2023, that is guiding work on this recommendation. ICFSA Directors/OCOW developed and presented MCFD with proposed content for joint action plan in late summer 2023, and two planning meetings have been held in August and September 2023 between MCFD and OCOW society however, RCY notes that the action plan is now six months overdue. The first initial meeting with MMHA for the joint action plan development was held on October 13, 2023, with further working group meetings scheduled. As no evidence of progress towards an action plan, or to addressing the intention of the recommendation has been provided, RCY has assessed this as no progress given the parties remain in the pre-planning activities.

Recommendation

#2 MCFD and ICFSA Directors, in collaboration with the MMHA, co-lead the development and implementation of policies and processes for initial mental health screening by qualified professionals of all children who are at risk of admission into care, or who have been admitted into care, with periodic and situational screening after initial screening, as required. This screening is to be carried out in a trauma-informed and culturally safe and relevant manner – including the potential development of validated Indigenous-specific screening instruments over the longer term – with disaggregated data being centrally collected and analyzed to inform service planning on an ongoing basis.

The Representative will be monitoring how MCFD and ICFSA Directors will use their new <i>Agreement to Collaborate</i> to work together in a timely manner to respond to recommendations.

RCY is concerned to see this delay given the annual progress report indicates that ICFSA Directors will use their new <i>Agreement to Collaborate</i> to work together in a timely manner to respond to recommendations.

MCFD offers that the <i>Children, Family and Community Service Act</i> and current ren and youth in care policies include mental health care as part of health care needs that addressed in the current care planning process. MCFD also reports that a review of a child's to health care, including mental health care will commence in 2024.	No Progress RCY does not accept that the <i>Children, Family and Community Service Act</i> and the current children and youth in care policies make clear that children have a right to health care, that includes mental health care. Instead, policy directs MCFD staff to document mental health history and issues in the Care Plan process and outlines their responsibility to make referrals. This falls short of the intention of the recommendation to ensure that the right of a child in care to have access to mental health care when required is established in legislation. Mental health is not included in ongoing health care monitoring requirements for MCFD workers, nor is it included in s.70(1) of the CFCSA which outlines the Rights of Children in Care. RCY has recommended an amendment to the statutory rights of children in care so that children in care receive medical, dental and mental health care when required given the prevalence of mental health disorders identified in this report. When the research findings are considered in the context of the volume of critical injuries and deaths reported to RCY that are connected to mental health disorders, the current legislation and policy is insufficient.
